Reconciliation Initiatives (RI) exists to equip Anglican Christians and their churches to be agents for reconciliation in wider society. We are a member of Coventry Cathedral's Community of the Cross of Nails, and we work in partnership with a group of gifted trustees, associates and staff. RI has two main offerings, both learning and development programmes:

- Being White: a 4-month racial justice programme addressing the culture of whiteness in the church; and
- Reconciling Mission: an 18-month programme resourcing leaders /churches for deeper engagement with local community and neighbourhood.

Tricia Hillas – Conference Chair

Tricia is Chaplain to the Speaker of the House of Commons, and the Canon Steward and Archdeacon at Westminster Abbey in central London. She is also a member of the Archbishops' Commission for Racial Justice in the Church of England.



Martyn Snow – Keynote Speaker

Martyn is the Bishop of Leicester, since spring 2016. He is actively involved in interfaith work and his diocese's Intercultural Worshipping Communities programme, and has a background of working with the church in different parts of the world. He entered the House of Lords in 2022.



Sharon Prentis - Conference Speaker

Sharon is the Deputy Director of the Church of England's Racial Justice Unit, and also Canon theologian at Lichfield Cathedral. She has previously served as Dean of Ministry at St Mellitus College, and Intercultural Mission Enabler and Dean of BAME Affairs for Birmingham Diocese.

Alastair is Director of RI, having founded the charity in 2017; and is the Associate Priest in the parish of Malvern Link with Cowleigh. An author, he also works as a freelance consultant, coach and adult educator. Alastair cofounded and directed Bridge Builders for 20 years until ordination in 2015.
